

THE STORY OF REKHA

In 2006, a French woman sighted a girl child, living on the pavements of CST station with her blind parents, and approached the Ra foundation. Ra Foundation put her through residential schooling, where she excelled in academics, and found her passion in arts and drawing. Rekha is now a teacher of Mandala Art at the institute at which she was trained. Today she supports her blind mother and father.

For the past 18 years, Ra has supported vulnerable children like Rekha, through the Happy Kids Program's residential school program. Our first set of Alumni graduated just before COVID-19 and our founder trustee was convinced that the program can help kids flourish with academic and financial independence and catapult them out of the multi-layered distress faced by kids in communities. It was his vision that Ra became an organization that is able to sustain itself beyond the founder, Sunil Nayak.




















WHERE ARE WE IN 2022-23

As of 22-23, our program supports an enrollment of 19 children in school, 22 in college, and all our alumni have embarked on their respective journeys. Our alumni have pursued education at prestigious residential schools in Maharashtra. Remarkably, 80% of our alumni have already secured gainful employment, making strides in various sectors, including medical services, hospitality, retail, and development. Their achievements serve as a testament to the transformative power of education and mentorship, fueling our commitment to nurturing future generations.

WHERE ARE WE IN 2022-23



THE PROBLEM STATEMENT

A positive, nurturing, and healthy environment is an indispensable part of children's learning. The environment influences overall well-being and development. Here the term "environment" not only refers to the physical environment, but the primary focus is on the emotional environment as well. Several factors affect a child's growth, learning and development



THE PROBLEM STATEMENT

But for a child and a family that experience intersectional vulnerability arising out of inter-generational poverty, are caught up in a relentless cycle of poverty which is passed down from one generation to the next, indicating that impoverished parents have impoverished children. Their current environment does not provide any of the developmental needs of a child.



This issue is only 10x amplified in cases of single-parent/no-parent situations which is one of the key vulnerabilities we address. In single-parent households, the parent is left with no time for child care as she/he has to be the breadwinner. This exposes the child to living in the community without parental care.




The multi-layered distress of vulnerable families impede them from providing a fair chance for the child to achieve their full potential

A small strand of this problem can be visualized as:

- The parent/guardian/caregiver is impaired as a consequence of their living conditions to invest in their children while fighting for survival.
- The child hence becomes a burden if not engaged in labor to bring in additional income to the family and does not have the tools to explore their own full potential
- There is anxiety, violence, negligence, and unsafe environment as an outlet for all the suppression and exploitation perpetuated by the cycle
- This can lead to massive consequences in the system leading to an increased burden on human development indicators such as health, education, increased violence, and mortality.
- Therefore, how might we ensure children from the most vulnerable households build a vision for themselves and have all the tools to break the cycle of inter-generational poverty?







THE SOLUTION

ALLOWING SOCIAL MOBILITY FOR THE CHILD

It is important for the child to be removed from an unsafe and distressed environment and be exposed to avenues that will allow them to experience success for themselves. One of the most important models that exist to achieve this is boarding schools. It is the most welloiled institution of care, which looks after physiological needs for healthy growth, fair chance with quality education, safety, and consistency. This will provide the fairest chance for a child from the most vulnerable environment to achieve their full potential.

FOCUS ON PSYCHOSOCIAL WELL-BEING

Boarding schools have children from varied backgrounds with many children who already have their basic needs met and have a higher chance of feeling safe and belongingness in a new environment. However, this is a radical concept for children from vulnerable homes who have experienced trauma from quite early. So it is imperative to deeply handhold them on a psychosocial journey that can build their emotional awareness, resilience and self-esteem. Only then will they be able to visualize a healthy future for themselves.


ENCOURAGING HEALTHY FAMILY FABRIC

With the child being away, it is important for the family (parents, guardians, and caregiver) to understand that this is a shared responsibility. While the child is working on himself, the family has a responsibility to look within. It will be a key part of the puzzle where the family also equally builds their emotional resilience and capabilities on parenting and care within the boundaries of their situation so that the fabric of the family continues to move upwards.



Viraj School extends additional counseling services for new enrollments, conducted by both the counselor and the school principal. The school dedicates considerable time to assisting newcomers in integrating seamlessly into the residential school environment. Moreover, Viraj organizes outings and movie trips to theaters, enhancing the social and emotional wellbeing of the students.



PROPOSED YOUTH PROGRAM

Comprehensive youth development program focusing on education and career pathways, healthy and sustainable life choices, and building a healthy social fabric within families.



CONTEXT

- Youth programs are a sanctuary of hope for young individuals. Life during the youth phase could get complicated and the youth feel lonely despite being surrounded by people.
- The program can impact the youth emotionally and practically. By creating the relevant spaces in the program, a youth can open up and disclose their insecurities regarding life.

EDUCATION & CAREER

- Focus on career guidance, and skill development aligned with their interests and aptitudes.
- Provide financial, academic, and emotional support throughout the academic journey of post-school education.
- Early exposure to the workforce through internships and apprenticeships, industrial and corporate visits, The mentorship program provides exposure to industry experts, relevant events/conferences where they can widen their horizons



HEALTHY AND SUSTAINABLE LIFE CHOICES

- Equip Youth with socio-emotional skills, mentorship, and support to make rational, ethical, and sustainable life choices.
- Create awareness about engaging in high-risk activities. Create a support network through counseling, mentorships, and weekly discussions with the Ra coordinator.
- Foster a sense of responsibility, judgment, and long-term decisionmaking abilities by helping them understand themselves and building capacity.

HEALTHY SOCIAL FABRIC OF THE FAMILY

- Work with families to cultivate tolerance, empathy, and effective communication.
- Provide training and support to parents/caregivers on positive parenting, child protection, and role modeling.
- Foster resilience, respect, and conflict resolution skills within families, creating a nurturing and supportive environment for children.

"PEP Talk, is Ra Foundation's initiative to provide a public speaking platform to the youth to either share their transformation journey or talk on topics that inspire them. 
LIFE SKILL SESSIONS FOR YOUTH

STRENGTHENING TEAM THROUGH RETREATS AND EMPOWERMENT

Our annual retreat in Igatpuri served as a vital capacity-building exercise for our team, gearing us up for the upcoming year.



SNAPSHOT OF THE YEARS' ENROLLMENT

Thanks to our NGO partners, Akanksha Foundation, Muktangan Charitable Trust, Ashiyana Foundation, Educo, CORP, TFI, and individuals/social workers, we received 36 references for this academic year. Our team at Ra Foundation processed all the references by meeting with kids, parents, and social workers in person to understand their level and interest in academics, as well as their family background.

Through a rigorous process of personal meetings, home visits, assessments by educators, health check-ups, and counseling we were able to finalize 11 kids who have completed their clinical investigations as per school criteria. In the 1st week of March, we arranged a visit for the kids, their parents, and respective social workers to one of our partner schools, where assessments of the kids were carried out. As a result, 6 kids are already enrolled in the Ra Happy Kids program and have started their academics for 2023-24, taking admission into the school.





PARTNERSHIPS & BEYOND

PROJECT PARTNERS

Ra Foundation is growing in every aspect, and so is our reach! For the enrolment of new kids for the next academic year, the team is reaching out to NGO partners who are working closely with communities in Mumbai. Two NGOs have shown keen interest to partner with Ra Foundation. One of them i.e. Muktangan, invited us to address a gathering of parents whose cases had been shortlisted for the Happy Kids Program. This was an orientation of the Happy Kids Program which was addressed by Vaishali and Sunita, followed by our alumni and a youth in the program. They shared powerful testimonies on how their lives have been touched and transformed through the program. Inviting the youths to be part of such a core process in the programme

has left a deep impression of importance in their hearts. The impact of orientation was felt positively and we hope to continue the same process with other NGOs too.

FUNDING PARTNERS

We have two new organisations supporting us under their CSR programmes. Philip Capital, India's prominent share and stock broking company, is supporting four of our youth in college. ADF Foods, a leading food manufacturing company with presence in 55 countries is sponsoring the education and boarding of two kids in school. Animedh Trust and "I was a saree' work jointly to empower women by helping them to earn a livelihood and live with dignity. They were impressed with the work of both organisations and heard stories of women who strived hard to come out of challenging conditions through sheer hard work and determination. Ra feels honoured to have partnership with such organisations that resonate with the philosophy of empowerment with dignity.

Seema's inspiring journey began in challenging circumstances as a single mother's child with two younger brothers, living in a slum community. With limited access to education, she attended the Municipal School mainly for the midday meals. Ra Foundation intervened and enrolled her in a residential school in Panchgani. This turning point opened up a world of opportunities for Seema, as she not only blossomed academically but also discovered her passion for sports. Upon completing her schooling, Seema was resolute about her career path and aspired to join the field of Hospitality. Through hard work and determination, she successfully secured admission to IHM, Chennai, marking a lifechanging experience as she embraced an independent life in a new city. She is currently working at Armani Exchange in Chennai and looks forward to growing in the retail sector.



KUMAR CHAVAN

HOSPITALITY PROFESSIONAL

At a young age, Kumar faced the heartbreaking loss of his father, setting off a series of challenges for his family. With his mother and two sisters, they lived in makeshift accommodations, constantly moving from one place to another, leading to frequent changes in schools. This instability resulted in increased absenteeism and the potential risk of dropping out of school altogether. Enrolling in a residential boarding school in Panchgani proved to be the turning point in Kumar's life. Here, Kumar flourished academically and also developed a passion for sports. Upon returning to Mumbai, Kumar pursued his dreams by obtaining a degree in Hospitality Management from Sophia Polytechnic. He achieved a significant milestone by securing a position as a pastry chef in a renowned restaurant. After having to work for some time in the kitchen, he decided to switch to service and is now the Captain of 'Malido Cafe' at Kala Ghoda
